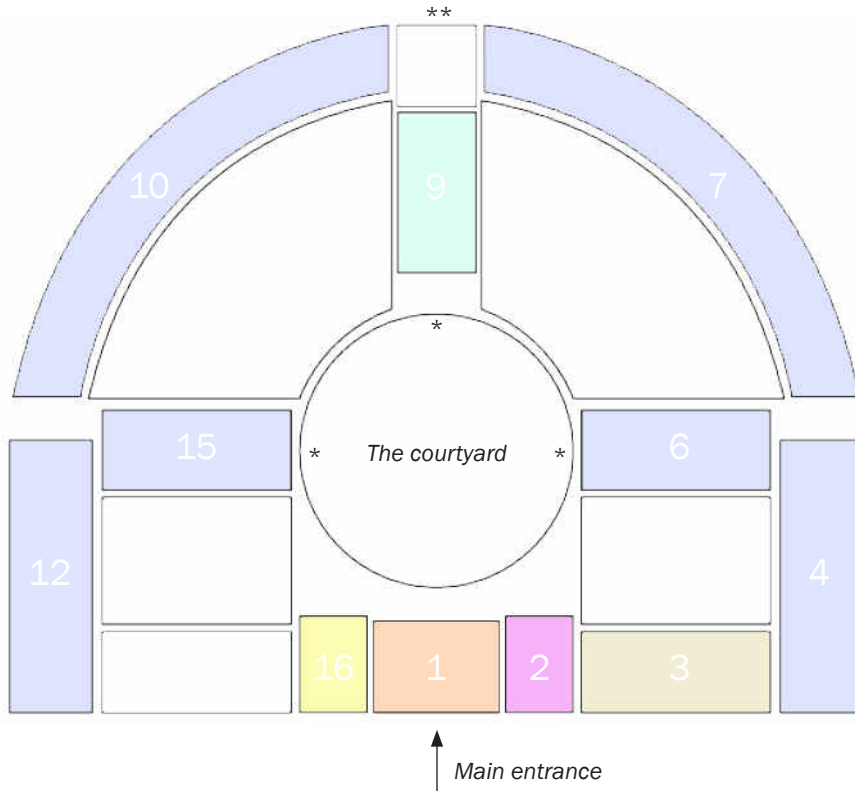

The Hellenic Philatelic Society (HPS)



In 1924 a new philatelic journal *Philotelia* was published in Piraeus, by Stephanos Macrymichalos. One year later, S.M. together with other prominent journal subscribers founded in Athens the Hellenic Philatelic Society (HPS, <https://hps.gr>).

Philotelia immediately became the official organ of the Society. The journal continues to be published without interruption till today, with most of its research articles written both in Greek and English, and usually achieving highest awards in international exhibitions. At the same time, the HPS is practically the focal point for every researcher in the philately of Greece and areas.

As early as the first years since its foundation, the HPS worked as counsel to the State, contributing significantly to the establishment of legislature on the use of postage stamps and the fight against counterfeits. In a very short time it evolved to a study centre of the Greek stamp. Research articles in *Philotelia*, publication of reprints and autonomous-works became the foundation for a significant library of philatelic knowledge.

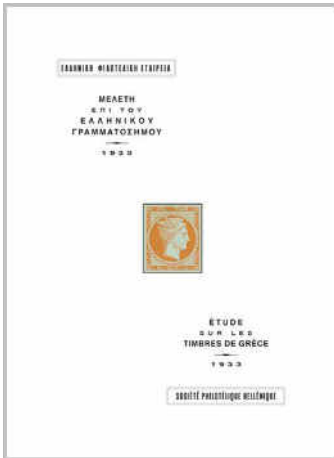
In 1929 the HPS became member of the International Philatelic Federation (FIP), representing Greece. In 1933-37 it published in Greek and French the emblematic two volume

The first is the highest honour of the HPS, awarded basically for significant services to Hellenic philately, promotion of the Greek stamp or long term services to the Society. The second is awarded to the best article published in *Philotelia*.



FEPA Certificate of Appreciation

In 1975, the HPS was honoured by the Academy of Athens for its cultural contribution and the uninterrupted publication of *Philotelia*. In 2000 the Society was awarded with the Certificate of Appreciation by the Federation of European Philatelic Associations (FEPA). In 2010, *Philotelia* was honoured with the Philatelic Press Award by the Académie Européenne de Philatélie (AEP).

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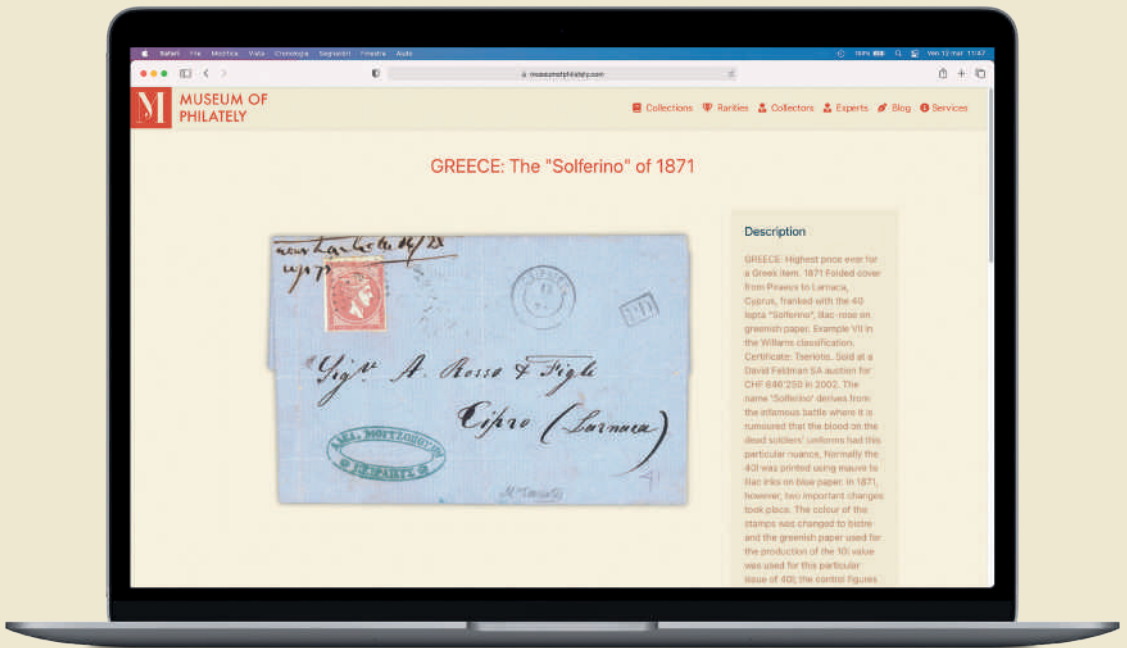

NOTOS 2021 Miniature Sheet



Designed by Dr. Myrsini Vardopoulou AEP Hon, this is the illustration of the NOTOS 2021 miniature sheet due on 19th November, the opening day of the exhibition.

Engraving expects an artist to lower himself and approach the humility and goodness of a craftsman. Being attached to the material, an engraving is not revealed to many but to the familiar... Those who see how a work has been engraved - the source of its aesthetic value - will be able to appreciate it in its entirety. [Zacharias Papantoniou, 1938]

The thoughts of the great Greek poet and writer perfectly express the attempt to design the NOTOS 2021 miniature sheet, definitely more than the beauty of the engraved metal itself, which functions autonomously as a work of art, well before the printed paper reveals to the viewer the composition of the design. It expresses the great moment in which two leading figures in engraving, of two different periods, Albert Barre and Yannis Gourzis, will meet at the Court of Honour, with two magnificent pieces of work dedicated to the most celebrated Greek stamp.

NOTOS 2021 Commemorative Postmarks

NOTOS 2021 OC proposed to the Hellenic Post four commemorative postmarks. Each will bear a different word of Greek origin, spelt in English and Greek, with the same meaning in both languages, pronounced exactly the same or pretty close. The first two are strongly bonded to philately, while the last two to the philatelist.



Philately started a century and a half ago as a pleasurable activity, a collection of postage stamps found on family correspondence. The interest in philately spread rapidly, because of a tremendous growth in the number of letters sent during the second half of the 19th century. The humans, of all living species on earth, were capable at last to enjoy the divine gift: the “logos”, their ability to communicate, either orally or in writing. It is the written part of “logos” which is responsible for the huge success of philately.

The postal revolution by Rowland Hill and the introduction of the postage stamp in Great Britain in 1840 was the key to the transformation of postal operations all around the “cosmos”, i.e. the universe, or in our case the world. After three decades or so, the postage stamp had been adopted by every nation on earth. This in turn meant that philately was spread wherever a postman could deliver a letter. Philately could grow anywhere, thus it became the dearest hobby of everyone, the hobby of “cosmos”.



A philatelist is a person engaged in philately, a hobby in various forms. It can be a pure and simple collection of stamps, covers, postcards, postal cancellations etc. It can be a collection aiming at research in postal communications which publishes papers in relation to sociology or history. Or, it can be anything in between, in any form the philatelist so desires. Whatever the type of his collections, each time he acquires a new item, he is overwhelmed with “enthusiasm”! It is the exact same feeling when his research goes a step beyond, or when he proudly stares at his own exhibit in an exhibition: “enthusiasm”!

What makes philately really special is that, when we talk about “us”, we like very much to emphasize that we belong to the “philatelic family”. Undoubtedly the term has been around for a very long time for a very simple reason: it is the behaviour of the vast majority of fellow philatelists which is pretty much exemplary: it is their character, their principles, their values. All these and much more are summed up by “ethos”, which undoubtedly says it all.

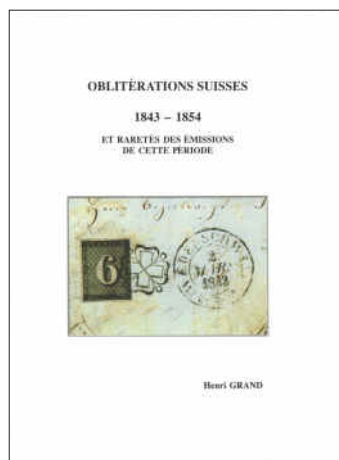

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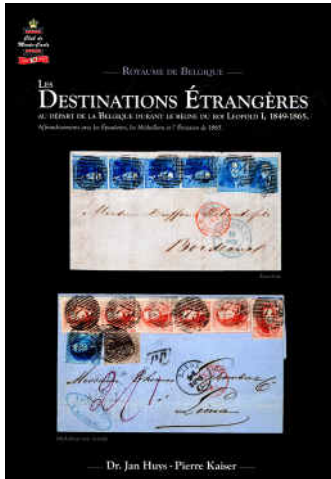

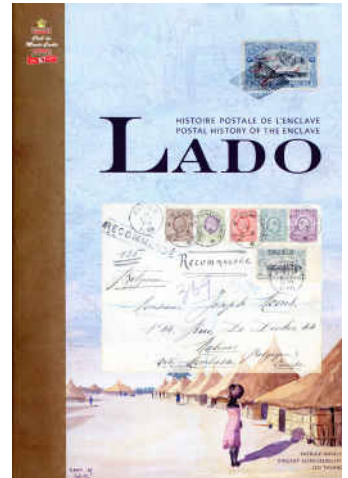

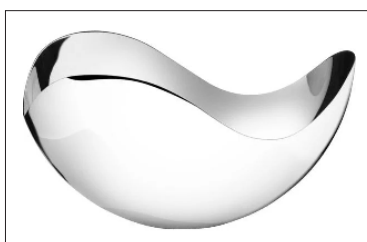

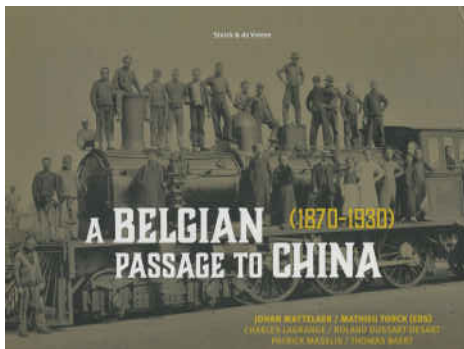

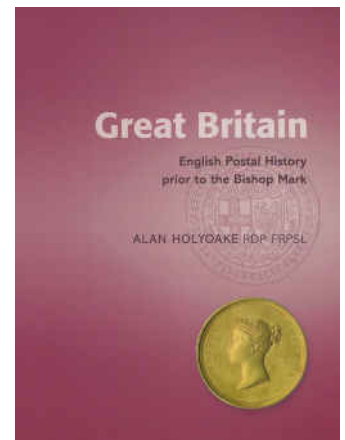

General State Archives “Genesis of the Hellenic Post”

Right from the start of the Greek Revolution it became necessary to secure communication lines between the Administration and the military corps in the Peloponnese. After several attempts the service was finally granted to A. Kardaras on an annual contract. Attempts to create a postal line were also made in Messolonghi as well as between Athens and Nafplio but were both unsuccessful.

The first Governor, Ioannis Kapodistrias, arrived in Greece in January 1828. One of his first concerns was the establishment of the Hellenic Post that would serve not only the Administration but also any interested individual. It was indeed founded in September 1828.

The General State Archives will display in NOTOS 2021 a number of documents between 1823 to 1830, all related to early postal communications.

1. Letter by the Minister of Interior to the Executive Body, in which he sets out the causes that prevent him from doing what the Executive Body imposes about the establishment of the Post Office. Furthermore, he refers to the need of the existence of a Post Office and for all horses to be near the Administration. He also refers to the difficulties raised by the Caretaker and he accuses him of self-interest and profiteering. Nafplio, October 1823. 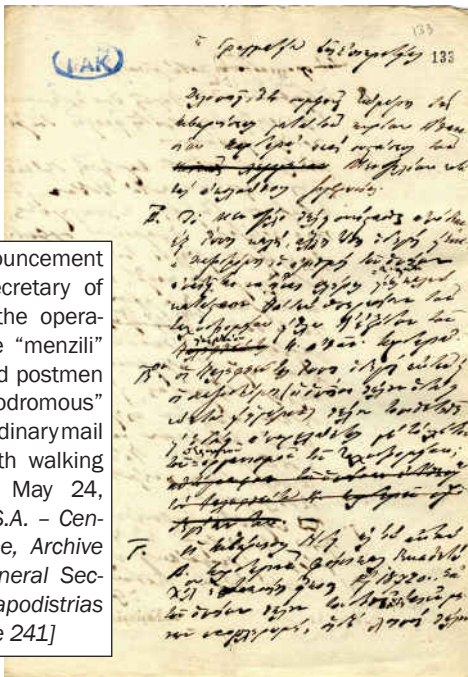

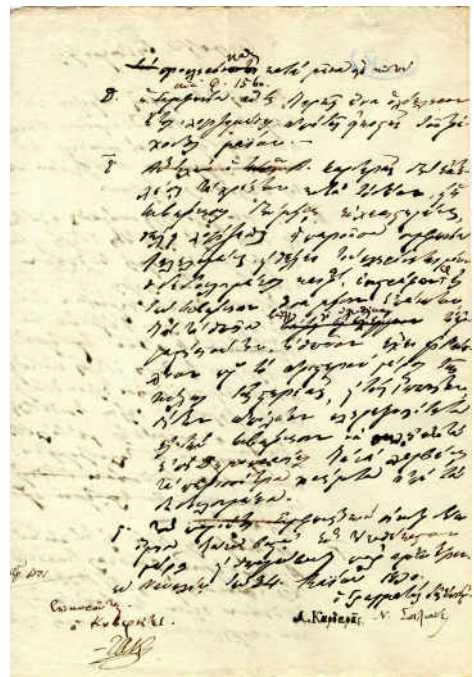

“The Large Hermes Head Medallion die and its matrix”



The original medallion die was realised by the Chief Engraver of the French Mint in Paris, Désiré-Albert Barre (1818-1878), in late 1860 / early 1861. The Hermes head effigy was engraved on mild steel, using the technique of engraving called “taille de relief”, also named “gravure en épargne”. The engraver etched on each side of the line which he wished to achieve, in order to obtain the line in relief. The “gravure en épargne” method is used for the engraving of punches (or dies) intended for the manufacture of plates for typographical printing. Indeed, in typography, it is the projecting parts of the plate that print the sheet of paper, by pressure, after having been inked.

The original medallion die is the only one to have been engraved by Désiré-Albert Barre; all the other parts of the final die were created by the other members of his staff at the French Mint in Paris.



The final die of the Large Hermes Head, the only one ordered by the Hellenic Postal Administration, was issued from this original medallion die, in fact from its matrix (see the following description of the matrix of the medallion die).



When Désiré-Albert Barre had finished the engraving of the original medallion die, he struck a matrix. By matrix we mean: a punch obtained mechanically by use of the original die to press (or strike) a block of soft steel in a coining press. The matrix is thus the inverse imprint of the original die, the recesses having become raised (in relief) and vice-versa.

The matrix was hardened and was used to create the final die. The final die was used to coin the 150 clichés of each typographic plate for the first seven values of the Large Hermes Head of 1861.

After a few early unfortunate experiences, this operation was made almost systematically by Chief Engravers in the French Mint to enable them, if necessary, to recreate, or modify the final punch. Indeed, the punches were subject to enormous mechanical forces during the tempering (or hardening) and/or during the striking operations which could alter their design or even cause breaks in the engraving. Thus, if a punch was broken or damaged in an operation, it was sufficient to recreate a new punch from this matrix which was retained for this purpose.

Preparations for the introduction of postage stamps in Greece had started well before 1st October 1861, the day the Large Hermes Heads were released at the p.o. counters.

The first bill was proposed, passed and the law was published in 1855. The fundamental changes it set out were:

- (a) mandatory prepayment of postal rates using postage stamps and
- (b) unification of the domestic postal rates, without taking into account the distance between dispatch and destination offices.

The law of 1855 was supposed to be enforced on 1 January 1856. After its two postponements, several changes within the government and the implications of the Crimean War, another law was published in May 1860 which was finally implemented.

The Greek government tried to negotiate first with Perkins, Bacon & Co. of London, however with no success. In July, the Greek Ambassador in Paris, Dimitrios Kallergis, ap-

proached Théophile-Jules Pelouze, President of the Monnaie de Paris (the Paris Mint). The government's request was the supply of dies, printing plates and tools necessary for the production of Greek postage stamps. Désiré-Albert Barre, the Chief Engraver of the Monnaie de Paris undertook the task to construct the steel dies and the bronze plates. He also supervised the first printing of the Large Hermes Heads that took place in Paris, before sending them to Athens.

The seven plates were never repaired or replaced. After their arrival in Athens, they were used continuously for more than 20 years (1861-1882) in order to produce all the Large Hermes Heads values of 1 lepton and 2, 5, 10, 20, 40 and 80 lepta. The plates measure 22x38x2 cm and weigh 11 kg.

Today, the plates are kept in the vault of the Philatelic and Postal Museum in Athens. Six of the seven plates are intact. The 20 lepta plate had been dismantled at some time in the past and in 2019-20 its reassembly was worked upon and carried out successfully.

All seven plates will be exhibited to the public together for the first time during NOTOS 2021.

Philatelic and Postal Museum “Reassembly of the 20 lepta LHH Printing Plate”



The 1861 20 lepta plate of the Large Hermes Head had been dismantled sometime at the dawn of the 20th century, as indicated by Tryphon Constantinides in his *Etude sur les timbres de Grèce* in 1933. The pieces were initially kept in the National Printing House during the early years and subsequently in the Philatelic and Postal Museum following its establishment in the 1970s.

Out of the 150 clichés, 121 have survived to date, the rest are still missing, since at least the days of the *Etude*, where the missing pieces are clearly mentioned.

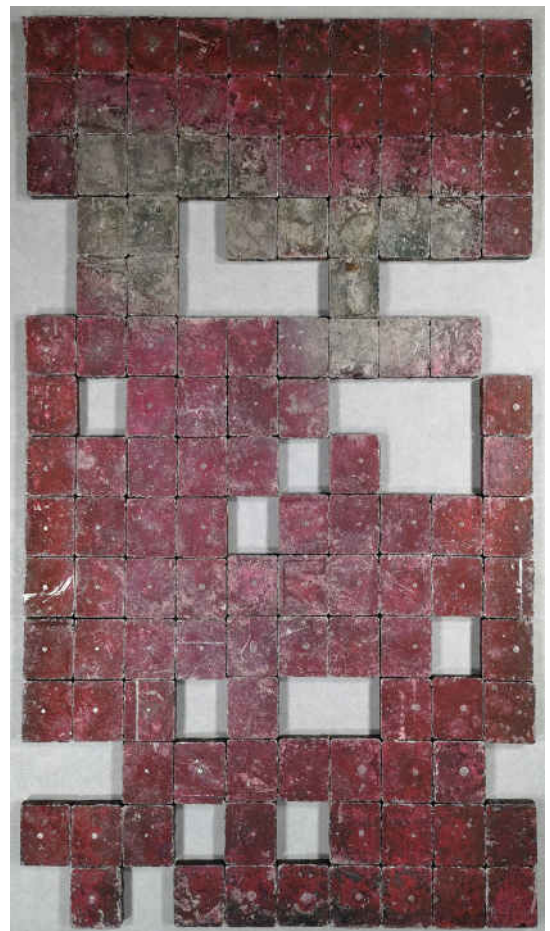
In 2019, following a NOTOS 2021 OC inquiry at the Philatelic and Postal Museum, permission was granted to attempt the reassembly of the plate. Stephano Calliga, a renowned connoisseur of the Large Hermes Heads, undertook the task to study thoroughly and exhaustively the 121 clichés in order to correctly position them on the plate.

On 14 October 2020, he had verified the plate position of all 121 loose pieces.

The arduous and ambitious task of the reassembly required more than the painstaking efforts of a diligent expert. It required a truly inspired artist, able to see through the technical complexities and overcome them in order to accomplish this outstanding feat.

“The Alexandria 30th September cover”



Cover franked with 3 singles 20 Lepta and one 80 Lepta Large Hermes Heads, Paris Print, total rate 1.40 drachmae (2nd weight cover carried by Austrian ship), posted from the Greek Post Office of Alexandria Egypt and tied with the dotted 97 and circle ΑΛΞΑΝΔΡΕΙΑ ΤΟΥΡΚΙΑ on the 30th September 1861 (one day before the official first day of circulation of the stamps in Greece).

The particular cover was probably delivered to the post office of Alexandria on Saturday the 30th of September 1861, where the clerk of the post office cancelled it, based on the post office circular of the 17th September, in order to be delivered to the ship that was leaving for Greece on Sunday morning, ignoring the announcement of the first day of circulation of the stamps, which should be on the 1st of October 1861.

A unique cover that initiates the adhesive postal history of Greece and a world rarity!

Various owners “The Great Encounter of the Solferinos”



Entire letter from Piraeus (13 July 1871, o.s.) to Larnaca, Cyprus. Cancelled on the reverse by transit postmark VIA LLOYD AGENZIE SMIRNE (27 July, n.s.).

Postal rate: 40 lepta for letters carried by Lloyd's ships from Greece to ports in the Levant. Boxed PD on the obverse shows the letter was paid to destination, alongside the Piraeus c.d.s. [exhibitor: David Feldman S.A.].

The Solferino is an 1871 40 lepta colour error that created the legend of an elusive stamp. Considered by some philatelists as the “Holy Grail” of Hellenic Philately and certainly being an intriguing stamp due to its nickname is - using a Buñuel film title - “That Obscure Object of Desire”.

During the Second Italian War of Independence, between the Franco-Sicilian and the Austrian Armies, two bloody battles took place: in Magenta on 4th June 1859 and twenty days later on 24th June in Solferino. Both small Italian towns became colour names as early as the 1860s. The Magenta prevailed and survived to this day as the M in CMYK in modern typography. The Solferino, described as deep pink with purplish tinge, and much less popular, was assigned to the Greek philatelic superstar.



The pair was first observed and reported by N. Z. Zafeirakopoulos in 2002 in "Philotelia" journal, following M. Tseriotis' presentation of the thirteen copies in David Feldman's auction catalogue, The Collection (I). The two stamps, cancelled together on some postal item, at some time later on were separated in order to journey around in various celebrated collections. In 2018, the exhibitor presented for the first time the re-joined pair along with other unique and world class rarities in his "Kassandra" Large Hermes Heads exhibit at the World Stamp Championship in Israel. He was awarded the Championship title [exhibitor: Stavros Andreadis].

The story behind this lilac-rose Large Hermes Head is less enchanting than its name. At the end of their shift, the printers had already printed the reverse side of a pile of stamp sheets with the correct lilac-rose control figures, while the front side of the sheets were still blank. The following morning they erroneously printed an unknown number of sheets of 150 stamps with the same lilac-rose colour instead of the typical rose-bistre or yellow-bistre shades of the regular printings of the 40 lepta stamps of the same period.

Until this day, thirteen Solferinos seem to have survived, all used; one on an entire letter and one on fragment; two singles that formerly were a pair, separated at an unknown, earlier date, and only in 2018 were again exhibited side by side, and nine single copies.

All the stamps are cancelled by the Piraeus p.o. dotted "2" or the corresponding c.d.s. On the postmarks of Solferinos just three dates were detected (12-14 July 1871) suggesting that not more than one sheet of the Solferinos must have been sold at the Piraeus p.o. counter.

A number of notable philatelists were the lucky owners of at least one Solferino in the past: Baron A. Rothchild, Edward Loines Pemberton RDP (1921) Alexander Argyropoulos RDP (1954), Nikos Alfieris, Thomas William Hall RDP (1921), Herbert Charles Vassall Adams RDP (1946), Charilis Binos, E. Spink, Herbert J. Bloch RDP (1968), Ronald A. Lee RDP (1965), Peter Holcombe. Undoubtedly the "champion" was George Zachariades from Cyprus who during the 1980s managed to own five copies, including the one on the entire letter and the one on the fragment.

Eleven of these long-lost "relatives" will meet each other for the first, and possibly the last, time ever at the Zappeion, during NOTOS 2021.

Jean Voruz

“Geneva from the Cantonal
to the Federal Post 1839-1862”



Jean Voruz FRPSL, from Lausanne (Switzerland) is a specialist of Swiss postal history with a focus on Geneva. He developed collections and is continuing research in these areas. He is president of the Consilium Philateliae Helveticae and secretary of HELVETIA 2022. At an international level, he is president of the European Academy of Philately and secretary of the Club de Monte Carlo. He is member of several national philatelic academies (Belgium, France, Russia), the Collectors Club New York and the Grand Prix Club. He is a national juror.

Jean Voruz was awarded the Lee Medal 2017 of the Royal Philatelic Society London and the Medal of Honour of the Kimmel Foundation for Postal History.

The exhibit displays mail handling at local, national and international levels during the three respective periods of the Cantonal Post, the Transition and the Federal Post. The birth of the Swiss Franc in Geneva was one of the most amazing processes in Swiss postal history. The new federal State decided postal and monetary unification, so that the standard would be the Franc of France. This standard had been already used in Geneva between 1839 and 1849. Until 1851 a process supported the parity change from 70 to 100 Rappen for 1 Franc of Geneva.

The exhibit currently displayed was awarded Golden Post Horn in 2010, FIP Grand Prix International in 2014 and FEPA Grand Prix in 2017.



Until 1849, mail forwarded to and from the different cantons of Switzerland was charged with postage due according to the successive postal services along the way.



Stamps from the cantonal post were recognized within the Canton only, because of the specific local currency and tariff until 1849.



Letter to Bossey, out of the Canton. Stamp invalidated by the postman.



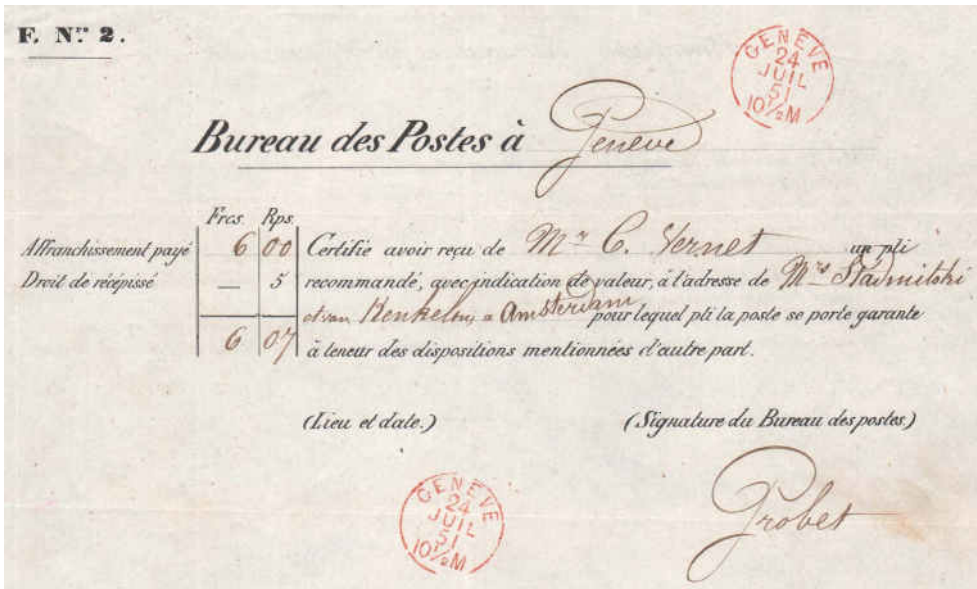
1st October 1849 is the first day of federal tariffs. The Post of Geneva adapts new postages with provisional red handstamps.



Starting the Transition period 1849-1850, incoming mail is charged postage due at the rate of 6 old Kreuzers = 15 Swiss Rappen = 21 cts of Geneva.



From the end of 1850, the new federal stamps are used according a provisional and odd rate: the stamp of 10Rp costs 15 cts of Geneva while the one of 5Rp costs 5cts.



In the absence of written regulations, this receipt is the only proof ever recorded that 5 Swiss Rappen were temporarily converted to 7 cts of Geneva: $6.00 + 0.05 = 6.07$



From 1852, the unified federal rates allow simplified postages. This one of 1855 is the earliest single use of a 1Fr. stamp in Swiss philately.

Stavros Andreadis

“Kassandra Collection: Greece – Large Hermes Heads 1861-1886”



The exhibitor, [Stavros Andreadis](#), started his collective activity relatively late, in his early fifties. His field is the Large Hermes Heads, the first stamps of Greece, designed by the famous French engraver Albert Barre.

He was immediately captured by the unique beauty of these stamps and the complexity of their different printings, papers and shades, combined with the existence of the so called “control numbers” on their back. Over the years, this became for him a true passion. He has published a large number of articles regarding the Large Hermes Heads.

By profession Stavros Andreadis is a businessman active in the tourism sector. He is the President of the Sani/Ikos group of hotels and has served as President of the Association of the Greek Tourism Enterprises.

His [Kassandra Collection: Greece - Large Hermes Heads 1861-1886](#) was awarded with Large Gold medals in the FIP exhibitions of Washington 2006, Portugal 2010, New York 2016 and received the World Stamp Championship in Jerusalem 2018. The exhibit displays the initial design of the stamp hand drawn by the artist, colour proofs, together with stamps and covers from the Paris and the first Athenian prints of the Large Hermes Heads.



On 17th July 1860, the Greek government contacted the Imperial French Mint to have the first Greek stamps printed in France. The famous chief engraver of the Mint, Albert Barre, prepared a magnificent model using a black French essay of 1853, whose centre had been replaced by a hand-drawn Hermes head and blended to the background by India ink. The upper and lower inscriptions intended for replacement are seen at the top right in pencil. At the bottom is a manuscript dedication of Albert Barre to his friend N. Rondot.

This is the only known artist’s model for the design of the Large Hermes Heads.



The primary die proofs were prepared by Albert barre between February and April 1861. The design is complete except for the value tablets. The first wavy line at the upper spandrel is intact. The depicted primary die proof in brown on thick paper, with several brush strokes from the artist in different shades, was used as colour proof for the 1 and 2 lepta values.

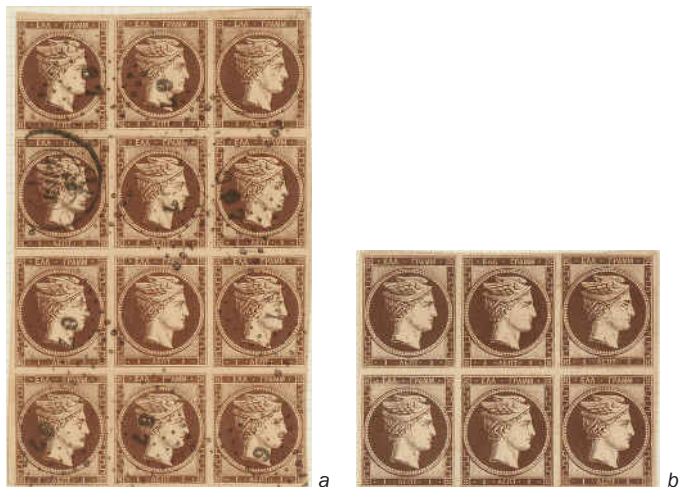
It is the only recorded example.



Letter sheet of the second weight scale (15-30g) mailed unpaid from Alexandria, Egypt, on 26th September 1861 (four days prior to the first day of use of the Greek stamps) to Syros, where it arrived on 1st October (first day of their official circulation). On arrival, 80 lepta was charged as postage due (handwritten 80) and two copies of 40 lepta, Paris prints, were affixed.

Eleven first day covers are recorded to date.

Unique usage of two 40 lepta on a first day cover.



1861 Paris print, 1 lepton colour varieties:

(a) Brown, used block of 12, cancelled by lozenge “67” of Syros, the largest such block recorded,

(b) Deep chocolate, mint block of 6,

(c) Reddish brown, used strip of 10, cancelled by lozenge “8” of Kalavryta, the only such strip recorded.



Letter sheet prepaid from Athens on 25th November 1861 to Triest, franked with a 20 lepta deep Prussian blue, provisional print, without Control Figures, showing quadrille background, in combination with three 5 lepta and a 40 lepta Paris print, making up the rate of 75 lepta to Triest.

This is the earliest date of use of all Athens issues.

Two covers with this combination of issues are recorded up to now.

Wolfgang Bauer

“Greece – Incoming and outgoing mail
and their destinations 1827-1875 up to UPU”



Wolfgang Bauer was born in Stuttgart on the 2nd of December in 1938, into a family of philatelists. His grandfather already collected stamps, and after recent findings in the history of his family, so did his great grandfather from 1863 on. It must have been the case with him as well when something like that runs in the blood. He began in 1965 to collect intensively Greece on the side, firstly because the picture was beautiful and secondly, he had not found anything more complicated in Europe– it was really a challenge!

The collection was growing, the knowledge was broadening and so he took the collection in the winter of 1984 to Athens for Hellas '84, the best exhibition for the Greek Hermes Heads in particular. This was his first competitive exhibition, for which he came out of nowhere and won the Grand Prix! Then he showed the same collection in Germany - Vermeil! That then caused a longer exhibition break, as one might imagine.

The Swiss Postal Museum in Bern invited him in 1991 to show a special exhibition of Large Hermes Heads with 26 frames, for four months. In New York at Interpex '92 he received the Grand Prix, whilst in the same fall the Grand Prix of the Honorary Class at Filotek '92 in Athens. In Athens in 2005 he exhibited Traditional and Postal History, each with 8 frames, side by side, for the very first time. In Germany, at Ibra 1999 (Nuremberg), and in London 2000 he won the Gold; whilst in Cyprus 2002 he won the Grand Prix (best exhibit). Then followed Valencia 2004, Washington 2006 and New Delhi 2011 with Large Golds for his traditional collection “Greece from 1861 to 1867” and the permission to exhibit in the championship class, which he did in 2013 in Rio de Janeiro.

In 1996, he was elected as the successor of Hermann Branz to the presidency of the Berlin Philatelic Klub of 1888 and has been there ever since. In February 2017, he handed over this presidency to a young successor and today he is vice president of the Klub. In recent years, the Greek Postal History has been pushed through him. Letters without stamps were really very difficult to explain. With this collection, he immediately then won the Grand Prix at the Philotelia 2005 in Athens. At the Naposta '05 in Hannover, in Malaga 2006 with 5 frames, in Lisbon 2010 and in Singapore 2015, this Postal History collection received international Large Gold.

He exhibited both collections of a country next to each other in the Championship Class in New York 2016, an achievement never reached before by a collector in the Championship Class!

The essay he has published in Greece in the national magazine *Philotelia* on the “Mixed Franking with Other Countries” caused quite a stir. He gave a testimonial lecture at the anniversary of the AIEP in Venice 2014 on “Mixed franking and their counterfeits” and two more lectures at the Royal Philately Society in London on “Ship mail to and from Greece” and also at the Collectors Club in New York on “Post-historical knowledge helps detect counterfeit letters”. He will never forget the meeting around the 125th anniversary of the Klub in 2013, when he brought the three important societies again together. People who attended this party are still talking about it all over the world when they meet.

“I wanted to complete this challenge of the difficulty of the Greek Hermes Heads because of the different rates, routes, and weights from year to year and country to country all over the world up to 1875– and I did it. Letters, especially before the era of the stamps and in connection with foreign countries are extremely complicated and actually much more difficult than letters with stamps! But you can find always new ones”!!



LS from Cesme in Turkey franked with 20 Para cancelled with doubleframed octagonal cancel of Cesme (Brandt Typ XV/15) in blue with arabic letters (partly repainted) for the postal charge in Cesme, via Scio-Cesme, where the Austrian Levant post office took over and franked with 10 Soldi to the Greek border in Syros, there finally taxed 20.8.1872 with the inland charge of 20 Lepta.

A unique combination with stamps of three countries on one route.

Normal Combination-Frankings (1862). It consists of two parts - the insufficient and therefore not accepted franking and the tax in Greece for the complete unpaid rate. Here we find an extraordinary exception together with the interception of letters in the post office in Vienna by Mr. Kallab, an employee there. In his shelves were found a lot of letters.

This one was franked with 15 Kr. to Berlin, sent after the discovery 15.4.1862 to Berlin, arriving 17.4. and sent the same day to Athens, on 19.4. again in Vienna and via Trieste to Athens, taxed there with the full rate of 110 L. for covers coming from the German-Austrian Postal Federation.



An extreme scarce Combination-Franking originating of a redirected LS via a foreign country.



Double rate from Syros one week earlier via France franked with 235 Lepta.

(Single: 95 L. to Austria + 50 L. Austria/France + 20 L. Inland = 165 Lepta)

Double: again 95 L. for Austria (less as 1 Loth) + 100 L. Austria/France (between ½ and 1 Loth) + 40 L. Inland (between 15 and 30 g) = 235 Lepta for a final weight between 15 and 17,5 g.



LS from Athens 15.9.1840 with Austrian Lloyd to Trieste and via Munich and Augsburg to Würzburg. In Athens the sender paid (ΔΠ) 10 Lepta internal and 120 Lepta as doubleweight to Trieste. The Austrian transit (AT) cost 20 Kr. ConventionsMünze converted to 24 Kr. rheinisch plus 14 Kr. rh. innerbavarian rate, so the addressee had to pay 38 Kr. rh., but the family left already to their watercastle in Mitwitz (even Bavaria), which was charged with another inner Bavarian 6 Kr., altogether should have paid 44 Kreuzer.



Registered letter (NB) from Copenhagen fully paid with 54 Skilling for a weight of 3/10 Loth.

Postage Paid 52 Sk + 2 Sk for receipt - Danish share 9 Sk + Registration fee 8 Sk = 17 Sk.

Foreign amount 52 - 17 = 35 Sk converted to 8 ¼ Sgr.

German share 3 Sgr - open 5¼ Sgr or 15 Kreuzer: Sea postage from Trieste 9 Kr. and Greek share 6 Kr.

Chris King RDP

“The Posts in the City of Lübeck before 1868”



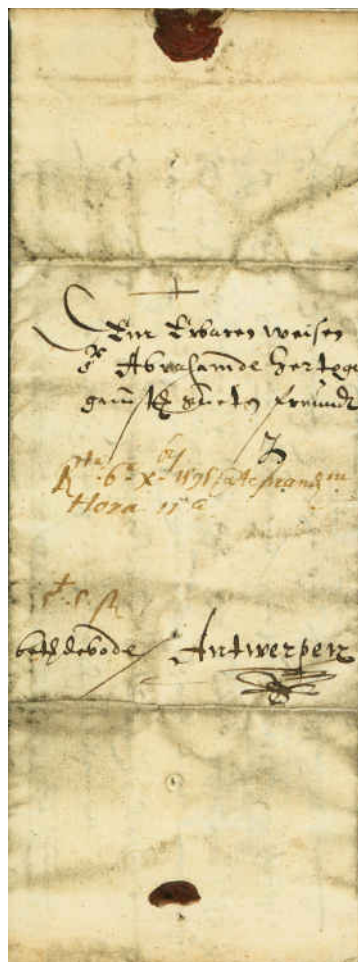
Chris King was a private collector before exhibiting for the first time in Stampshow 2000. He had for many years been a member of the Scandinavia Philatelic Society, but since then he has fulfilled many roles in organised philately including President of the Royal Philatelic Society London, Keeper of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists and others. Originally specialising in the postal history of the border region between Denmark and the German States, particularly the Duchy of Schleswig and the war of 1864 – The ‘First

War of German Unification’, he has developed a number of new exhibits including Lübeck, Napoleonic Denmark, the 1848-51 war between Denmark and the German States, and unstamped mail across the North Sea.

He has received a number of awards including: Signatory to The Roll of Distinguished Philatelists (2014). Die Professor Dr. Hans A. Weidlich-Plakette Deutschen Altbriefsammler-Verein e.V. (2014). 114th Deutsche Philatelistentag medal, Gotha, Germany (2015). Honorary Fellowship of The Royal Philatelic Society London, with the Bacon Medal of the Society (2018). AEP European Parliamentary Medal for Philately (2018). Lichtenstein Award of The Collectors Club of New York (2019). Medal for Exceptional Service to organised philately FEPA (2019).

However, he believes, and hopes, that his lasting achievement will have been to lead the team responsible for the move of the RPSL from its long-established address at 41 Devonshire Place in the City of Westminster to 15 Abchurch Lane in the City of London. It was certainly a complex task, and time – and future philatelists will judge his success better than he can.

Private Messenger (1595-): 9th September 1595, Entire letter addressed to Antwerp. It has no Thurn and Taxis markings, just the handwritten notation ‘Bats de Bode’. The receiver’s marking is ‘at frankere / hore 11x’ meaning the charge was paid, with the note at the lower left St. P. B. This is believed to be the earliest Hansa Messenger letter from the East to Flanders. It was not sent through the Thurn and Taxis postal service.

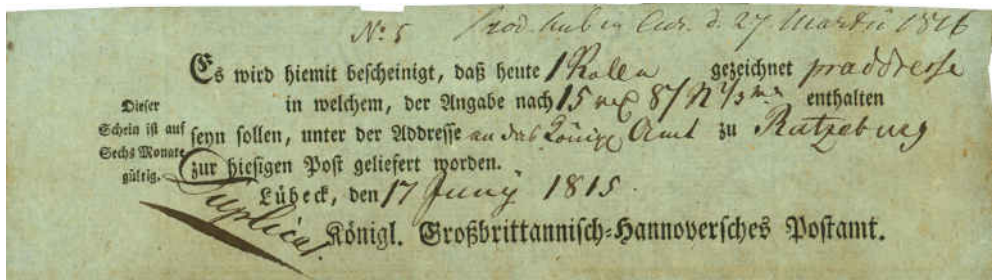


The Lübeck collection began because the city had a relationship with the Danish Post Office from 1697. He later discovered that it was a complex city in terms of its postal services, and that there had been very few exhibits entered in FIP shows. Finding it difficult to make an eight-frame exhibit using just the Lübeck material from the stamped period together with the Thurn und Taxis and Danish stamps, he decided that the best thing was to try to cover all of the postal services that had operated in the City from the Hanseatic messengers in the sixteenth century to the beginning of the North German Confederation on 1st January 1868. This made it a very attractive prospect for an exhibit, and for research, since there was also very little written in English.

What is shown in the Court of Honour represents the quest to cover all of the postal services, and as much of the postal history as can be found. Such an exhibit can never be 'complete' due to the limitations of space in an exhibition, but it will give the viewer an idea of how an independent city state managed to operate a local and international postal service from the early modern period until German unification began in the 1860s.



Lübeck City Post Office (1597-1868): 27th May 1862 Wrapper sent from Lubeck to Hamburg correctly franked according to the table published on 1st January 1859 by the City Post Office, with 1859 2 Schillinge stamp watermarked with 'Flowers'. This example showing value tablets engraved 2 with text in the left hand scroll ZWEI UND HALB - 2½. In addition to its great rarity, part of its charm is the fact that it belonged to Koch, Rothschild, Caspary, Boker and Haub, and was sold in the Gilbert & Köhler auction in Paris 1912.



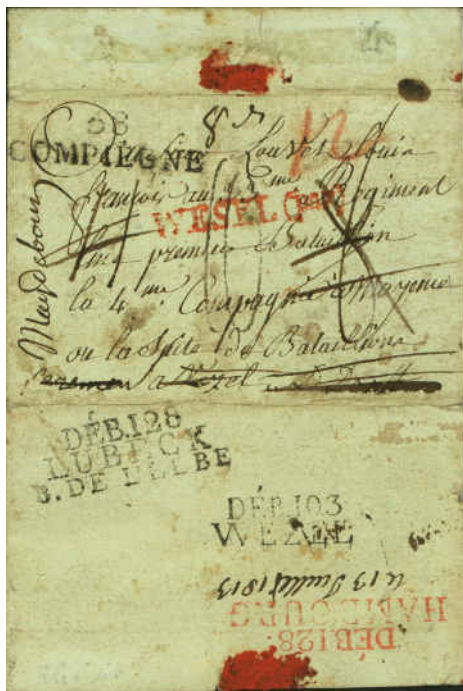
The Hanoverian Post Office (1700s to 1845): 17th June 1815, Royal Great British and Hanoverian Post Office. Duplicate receipt form for a money packet sent to the Königliche Amt in Ratzeburg from Lübeck (ArGe form number 62) recorded 3rd July 1816 to 1st May 1829.

Thurn und Taxis Post Office (1579-1867): 28th August 1864, Uprated Thurn und Taxis postal stationery envelope paying 16 Kreuzer rate to Claus-holm near Randers, in Jutland, Denmark, equivalent to 5 Silbergroschen, for postage from German Rayon 3 to Danish Rayon 2. Sent from Mainz via Hamburg, and Kolding, arriving on August 31st. Redirected via Copenhagen, as the southern route to the Duchies remained closed due to the Second Schleswig War of 1864, with an additional 8 Skilling in stamps for the rate to Holstein from 4th February 1864 to 31st July 1864 (Circular 4/ 1864) via Copenhagen and Lübeck to Hasseldorff in Holstein.



The Grand Duchy of Mecklenburg Post Office (1700s to 1840s): 7th November 1841, A number of post offices operated in the city without postage stamps and the only distinguishing features are destinations or origins, from the postal forms they used or from distinctive postmarks. This postal form from the Grossherzogliche Mecklenburgische Postamt is one such.

There are others from Hannover, Wismar and the Danish section of the City Post. Passenger tickets can be found from mailcoaches together with goods and other freight receipts.



The Département Les Bouches de l'Elbe (1811-1815): 28th May 1813, Entire domestic letter paid 8 décimes, the rate for a letter of 6-8 grammes carried for a distance of 400-500 Km. Sent from (Le) Meux, postmarked 58 COMPIÉGNE, to Mayence (Mainz), marked ou la suite du Bataillon (to follow the battalion). The letter was repeatedly forwarded and marked DÉB.103 WESEL, DÉB.128 HAMBURG, and DÉB.128 LÜBECK B.DE L'ELBE in use 1811-1813. Débourse marks were applied when a letter could not be delivered and allowed the receiving office to deal with the accountancy. The Hamburg office noted the date as 13 Juillet 1813. Re-rating took place at each step, 11 décimes in Wesel for a letter carried 800-1000 Km, and 10 décimes in Lübeck where it was redirected to Magdeburg in the then Kingdom of Westphalia, which existed from 1807-1813. Marked 12 (Centimen) in Westphalia and finally, probably, paid 10 décimes by the recipient.



The Swedish Post Office (1813-1816): 16th November 1815, Entire letter sent from Christiania (Oslo) to Nantes in France via Helsingborg, Lübeck and Hamburg. The Lübeck route avoided paying any transit fees via Denmark. Marked Franco Helsingborg and Amsterdam at Christiania post office, and prepaid 18 RBS domestic rate to Swedish border. Transit rate through Sweden to Helsingborg on letters going to Denmark across Øresund, and also to the Hanseatic City of Lübeck, was 9½ Sk. Bco, and the 4th quarter inflation rate was 9½ RBS = 1 Sk. Bco, Swedish transit = 9½ sk. bco. x 9,25 RBS = 90.25 RBS, rounded upwards, as usual, to 91 RBS, plus 18 RBS to the border = 109 RBS prepaid at Christiania. Helsingborg and Amsterdam deleted, and Lybeck added in Sweden. Redirection probably due to weather conditions being disrupted by the 1815 eruption of Mount Tambora causing 'the Year Without a Summer' in 1816. 5th December 1815 'Three Crowns' postmark added. Passed to Thurn and Taxis post office, handstamped R.4.LUBEK (ArGe 76) and forwarded to Nantes. 17 (Décimes) charged in Nantes for postage from Lübeck.



A Prussian 'accident in Lübeck (1863): 1st August 1863, Envelope bearing 4 Schilling in Prussian postage stamps (Mi.16 and 18A) on complete folded letter to Münster am Stein near Kreuznach, today Kreuznach. Stamps cancelled with the Lübeck barred canceller and dated with the Lübeck double circular date stamp for 1. 8. (1863). The Prussian stamps were cancelled by mistake with the Lübeck barred canceller, and the postal official wrote as an apology on the letter "The stamps are still valid, accidentally cancelled in Lübeck, Lübeck 1 Aug. 63 City Post Office. Schröder". The letter is marked with manuscript 4 Lübeck Schillinge which equalled 3 Silbergroschen, the postage between Lübeck and Kreuznach. The franking was thus recognised. Presumably the letter was handed over the counter or posted in a post box and was inadvertently cancelled, since the stamps are very similar in design to those of Lübeck, with both being engraved by H.G. Schilling in Berlin at the Government Printing Office. Ex Boker and Haub.

Philatelic and Postal Museum “The Matrix of the Large Hermes Heads 150th anniversary set (2011)”



“I undertook to create the commemorative stamp in the spirit that I was offering a service, rather than meeting an order”. These were the words of Yannis Gourzis, Assistant Professor in Engraving, at the Athens School of Fine Arts, in 2011, when he was asked to describe in detail his experience in an article in *Philotelia* journal a few weeks before the 150th anniversary stamps were to be placed in circulation (1st October 2011).

Depicted here is the original matrix engraved by prof. Yannis Gourzis. The intaglio process was used to print the anniversary stamps, except for the “1861-2011” label on top and the seven different euro values which were printed in offset.

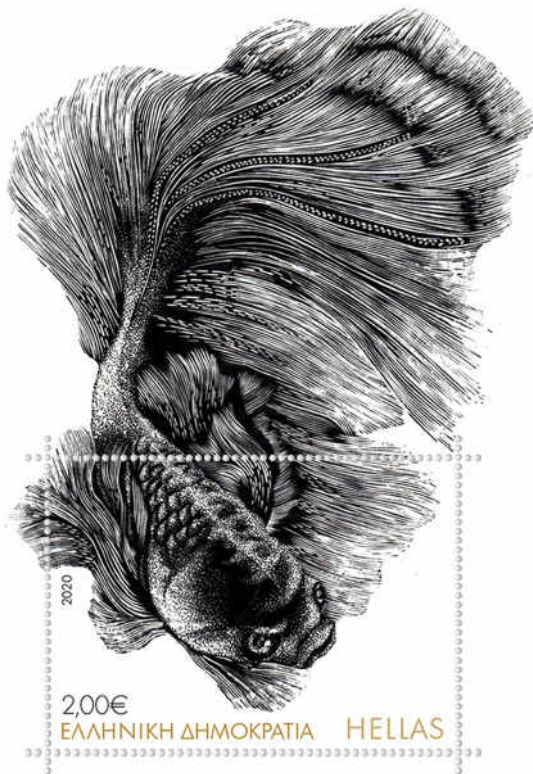

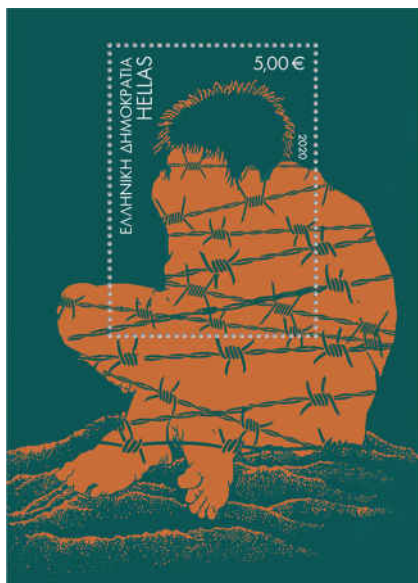

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PAPAL STATE - 1870

Insured letter sent from Rome to Jesi on 21 June 1870, franked with cent.80 carmine rose (also called geranium rose or "fragolone").

It is one among the 7 letters known franked with this kind of cent.80 and this is the only one with the stamp on its own!

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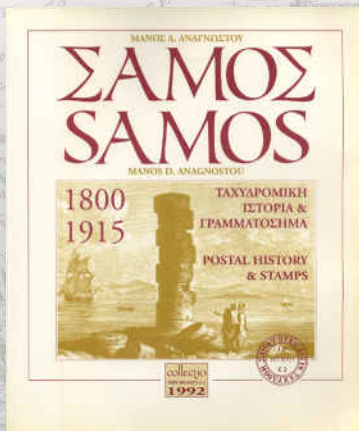

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The Zappeion

The vision of Evangelis Zappas

Evangelis Zappas was born in 1800 in Labovo, Epirus, then territory of the Ottoman Empire, today in Albania. He took part in the Greek War of Independence and reached the rank of Major. In 1831 he moved and settled in Wallachia (Romania), where he made a fortune in land and agriculture. In the 1850s, Zappas was considered one of the wealthiest entrepreneurs in Eastern Europe.

The idea of reviving the ancient Olympic Games had been raised from time to time during the early and mid-19th century, inspired to a certain degree by romanticism and patriotism. In early 1856, Zappas sent a letter through diplomatic channels to King Otto of Greece, offering to fund the revival of the Olympic Games, and to provide cash prizes to the victors. King Otto agreed to the organisation of athletic competitions at four-year intervals, with Zappas' full sponsorship, to coincide with industrial and agricultural expositions.

On 15 November 1859, the first Olympics (or Olympia in Greek) were held in a city square in central Athens. These athletic contests were the first Olympic Games of modern times with the provenance of ancient Greek roots and the intention of using an, as yet unready, ancient Greek stadium. That stadium, the Panathenaic Stadium, was first used for a modern Olympic Games in 1870, and for the first time since the ancient Panathenaea and Olympic Games. The athletes competed in a variety of disciplines, similar to those of the ancient Olympic Games: running, discus, javelin throwing, wrestling, jumping, and pole climbing.

Zappas left a fortune for the funding of future Olympics to be held at the Panathenaic Stadium. He died in 1865. His immense fortune was used for the construction of perma-

nent sporting facilities in Athens, as well as for the continuation of the Olympics. He also instructed on the building of the Zappeion Conference and Exhibition Hall, which is named in his honour and that of his cousin Konstantinos Zappas. The latter was the executor of his cousin's legacy, but also contributed considerable funds to the building of the Zappeion.

In 1869, the Hellenic Parliament made available approximately 80,000 sq. metres of public land between the temple of Olympian Zeus and what were, at the time, the palace gardens. This took into account Zappas' wish for the building to be as close as possible to the Stadium. Zappas' dream finally became a reality and in 1874 construction began on the Zappeion based on the designs of French architect François Boulanger and the Danish architect Theophil Hansen. The Zappeion was completed in 1888 and was used during the 1896 Athens Olympics as the main fencing hall. A decade later, at the 1906 Summer Olympics, it was used as the Olympic Village.

The Zappeion is the most celebrated Conference and Exhibition Hall in Greece, right in the very heart of Athens. It bore witness to all the major social, cultural and political events of the modern era.

In 1936 and for the next 40 years, it hosted the country's first state radio station. In 1940 it was converted into a hospital; the following year it was commandeered by the Nazi occupation army after which it became a storehouse and later a barracks (1944). It was even bombed during the same year. After the war, the possibility was discussed of demolishing it. Fortunately, in 1960, general repairs were carried out under the supervision of architects A. Ploumistos and F. Panagiotopoulos.

In 1979 its courtyard welcomed the European delegations at the signing of Greece's Accession to the EEC. The most recent renovation was carried out in connection with the Olympic Games of 2004 which were held in Athens.

The Zappeion is also well acquainted with philately. It hosted two memorable anniversary events: The world exhibition of Olympic and Sports stamps "Athens 1896-1996", on the occasion of the centenary of the Olympic Games in 1996, and an exhibition with treasures from the Philatelic and Postal Museum for the 150th anniversary of the first Greek stamp in 2011.

The 1896 Olympic stamps

A different perspective

The idea of Baron de Coubertin and Dimitrios Vikelas, the elected First President of the International Olympic Committee, to revive the ancient Olympic Games was finally realised in 1896, and Athens was chosen as the city to host the First Modern Olympics.

At that time the Greek State was unable to support financially the cost of the Games, that reached the amount of USD 448,000 (converted to 23,600 Gold Sovereigns*), therefore alternative means of funding had to be sought.

Sponsoring was a well-established tradition employed in staging the theatre games since the 5th century BCE in Athens. Today, in the old quarter of Plaka, just below the Acropolis, still stands the impressive 4th century BCE choragic monument of Lysicrates, a wealthy patron of musical performances held at the Theatre of Dionysus (Bacchus), to commemorate the prize of the Dithyramb Contest in the City Dionysia festivities in 335-334 BCE.



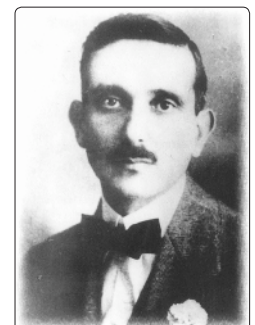

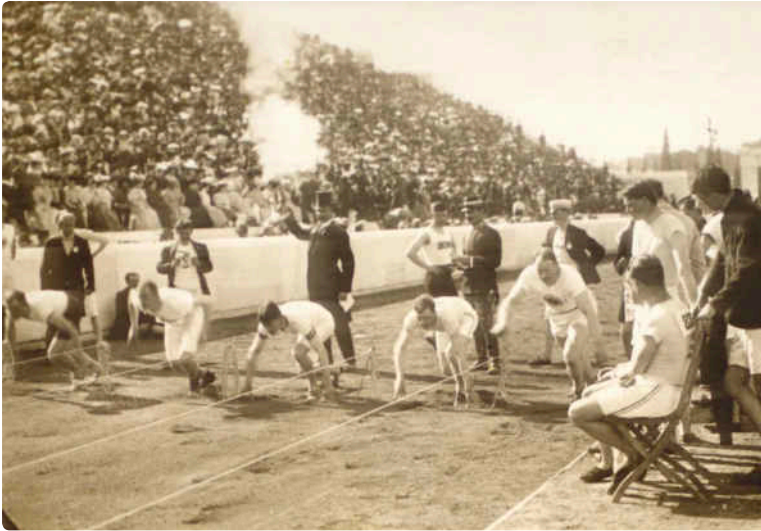

During the First Modern Olympic Games in 1896 the generous offers of the sponsors were not sufficient to cover the high costs of this international sporting event, and as a result other ways to raise funds were considered.

It is worth mentioning that George Averoff, a wealthy Greek businessman, had already donated the amount of 920,000 gold drachmae for the restoration of the ancient Panathenaic Stadium where most sports events of the

1896 Olympic Games took place. The stadium was refurbished in 1895, using top quality white marble from Mount Penteli according to Averoff's request.

It was the two Sakkarafos brothers, philatelists and sportsmen, that came up with a novel, brilliant idea which has opened new roads both in philately and the sponsorship of international events.

The invaluable financial contribution of the 1896 Olympic Games set of stamps is often overlooked, as the spotlight falls mostly on the quality of art and the themes selected for these stamps. The 1896 Olympic stamps' face value was nearly 20 drachmae per set and their sales of 400,000 drachmae (converted to 9,300 Gold Sovereigns) contributed to nearly 40% of the total organisational costs.

From a philatelic point of view, the importance of the 1896 Olympic set was also paramount not only because it is the first entirely "thematic" set (well before the thematic concept came into being), but also due to the fact that it was a set commemorating an in-

ternational event that was going to take place after the stamps were issued. The depictions of the 12 stamps are the pioneers in a number of thematic areas such as: Sports, Monuments, Religion-Gods, Architecture, Arts and Wine (the 2 D. stamp depicts the statue of Praxiteles' Hermes holding baby Dionysus - Bacchus, god of wine).

The 1896 Olympic issue also introduced a new dimension of stamp collecting, as these very stamps did not purely serve postage needs but were also representing a commemorative purpose.

It is only fair to mention that the selling success of the 1896 Olympic set was due to the fact that two renowned artists collaborated to create and produce it.

The designer responsible for the drawings, Emile Gillieron, was employed by Heinrich Schliemann - the archaeological excavator of Troy, Mycenae and Tiryns - as an archaeological illustrator. Later on, he worked as the major restorer of frescos and other Minoan artifacts for Arthur Evans at the amazing "Palace of King Minos" in Knossos, Crete. He was also the art tutor for the Greek royal family of King George I and the most celebrated of his students was Giorgio de Chirico. Gillieron, a talented and experienced illustrator working with archaeology professor Ioannis Svoronos, President of the Numismatic Museum in Athens, meticulously selected the themes of the 1896 Olympic stamps and the composition of the depicted elements as to create unique artworks.

Abyssinia and Argentina to Persia and Russia. For the 1896 Olympic stamps, Mouchon used the electrotype printing process (galvanoplasty), offering at the time the best possible, quality printing.

The 1896 Olympic stamps were not just an important philatelic innovation, they were also a significant financial contributor to the first modern Summer Olympics.

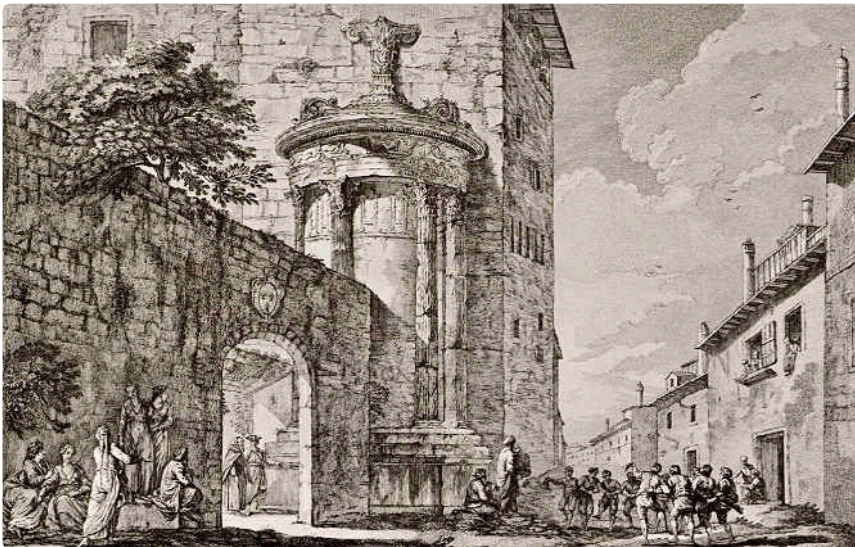

The Choragic Monument of Lysikrates in Plaka

Sponsorship as an institution was invented in Cleisthenes' Athens. It flourished during the Golden Age of Pericles and initially had to do with the financial support of the arts and theatre. It was considered a feat of charity as well as of national contribution. It is on this ancient institution that the NOTOS 2021 Organising Committee built, to a large extent, the whole project for the accomplishment of the exhibition.

The Monument of Lysikrates, also known as the “lantern of Diogenes” due to its cylindrical shape, is perhaps the best preserved monument of antiquity dedicated to sponsorship. It is located in Athens' Plaka district, on the ancient road of the Tripod, and was built by Lysikrates in 335-334 BCE. Its purpose was to support at its top the bronze tripod that was given to him as a prize for the winning play for which he was a sponsor. Its very form, or many of its morphological elements, have been a source of inspiration for architectural creations around the world.

In later years, the Capuchin Monastery (1669) was built on this site, which incorporated the Monument of Lysikrates within its walls. This is why the monument survives to this day in good condition. During the operation of the Monastery, it was first converted into a chapel and then into a library and reading room. The monks carried out great work caring for the sick, and eventually blended very well with the locals. They also engaged in cartog-

raphy and developed a remarkable educational activity. In the garden of the Monastery, the tomato was cultivated for the first time in Greece by Francisco, the Monastery's abbot (1818).

The Monastery's guest house hosted many European travellers. Among them were the Frenchman Fauvel, Elgin's rival, and the Italian Lousieri, who tried in vain, on behalf of Elgin, to bribe the monks in order to seize the Monument of Lysicrates. There were also many Philhellenes - François-René de Chateaubriand (1806) and Lord Byron (1810) are undoubtedly the most notable. The latter on his journey fell in love with the beautiful underage Teresa Makri. He dedicated to her the poem "The Maid of Athens". With his lyrics, Teresa would lullaby her little daughter years later, proof that her unfulfilled and platonic love affair with Byron never faded. In memory of his presence, the street near the Monument was named after him and its extension was named after another Philhellene and friend of Byron, Percy Bysshe Shelley. A few steps from the Monument, there is a small Christian church of the 17th century, where according to tradition, Athanassios Diakos, one of the first martyrs of the Greek War of Independence, served as a deacon for an unknown period of time.

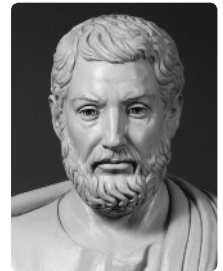
The Capuchin Monastery was destroyed during the siege of the Acropolis (1826-27). Until 1867 it belonged to the French State along with the Monument of Lysicrates, being an integral part of the Monastery. With a tacit friendly agreement, the ownership passed to the Greek State, after granting the French a piece of land at the foot of the Lycabettus Hill, for the French School at Athens (École française d'Athènes) and the French Institute in Greece (Institut français de Grèce).

Democracy in Greece

The Birth of Democracy in Athens

Democracy is the political system in which power and authority comes from the people, is exercised by the people and serves the people. Democracy's main feature is that decisions are reached either by direct voting or through representatives.

The word Democracy comes from the words "Demos" meaning the people's political body and "Kratos" meaning the State. Demos for ancient Greeks was formed by all people that had political - civil rights. The word Kratos in ancient Greek had the meaning of Authority. Therefore Democracy is the political system that authority is exercised by all the people having civil rights. The cornerstones of Democracy are: the right of gathering and free expression, social equality, right to participate in public affairs and the right of living.

These democratic prerequisites were instituted by Cleisthenes, for the first time in Athens, in 508 BCE. Democracy reached its apogee during the 5th century BCE. That was the "Golden Century" of Pericles, a skilful politician and orator and at the same time a great patron of Arts, Literature and Sciences.

Pericles was the driving force of Athens, when the city rose to the heights of an important cultural centre of the ancient world. The construction of several important monuments in Athens, including the ones on the Acropolis, are due to Pericles' vision.

“Democracy crowning Demos (the People)” (337/6 BCE). The stamp was issued in 1991 in commemoration of 2500 years of Democracy.

According to Aristotle, Democracy is the system in which the views and the will of the majority are established, without overlooking and disrespecting the rights of the minority. The necessary prerequisite in Democracy is that all the citizens’ actions respect certain boundaries that are defined by the laws and nobody is allowed to exceed these. It was considered that the excessive actions and the unaccountability of one person restricts the freedom of others.

The importance of Democracy for ancient Greeks is clearly shown by a marble stele, unearthed in the ancient Agora, north-east of the Acropolis. The stele depicts “Democracy crowning

Demos (the people)” with an inscribed Resolution of Demos against all would-be tyrants (oppressive rulers).

Democracy in modern Greece

The Greeks, just two months after the start of the 1821 War of Independence, gathered at the Kaltetzi Monastery, located in the centre of the Peloponnese, to discuss the fundamental principles for the drafting of a democratic political system.

At the closing of 1821, the First National Congress was organised in Epidavros, with representatives from all regions with large numbers of Greek population, which voted the “First Constitution of Greece”. The 1821 Constitution included the protection of personal and civil rights, political representation and the separation of Powers.

In 1827, Ioannis Capodistria, a former Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Russian Empire, was invited by the Greeks and accepted the honour of serving as the first Governor of Greece. Capodistria laid the political foundations of a modern State but due to his opposition to the established socioeconomic status quo, he was assassinated.

In 1830, the recognition of Greece as an independent State was signed in London by the three Great Powers (Great Britain, France and Russia), while at the same time monarchy was imposed, with Prince Otto (Othon),

the second son of King Ludwig I of Bavaria, who was favourable to the Greek Independence. Despite his good intentions, King Otto soon opted for an authoritarian style of governing. The 1843 popular uprising forced King Otto to concede to a constitution and thus a Constitutional Monarchy was established.

It was only 32 years later that the Prime Minister Charilaos Trikoupis convinced King George I (former Danish Prince who had replaced King Otto in 1862) to accept the “Principle of the Vote of Confidence”. This meant that the King should agree to appoint a Prime Minister who in turn had to seek and secure a vote of Confidence in the Parliament, otherwise the appointee should kindly reject the offer.

The first two-thirds of the 20th century was a turbulent political period. Democratic governance was frequently interrupted by short-lived coup d'états. Before WWII, one of the most important upsets of the constitution occurred in 1936. Prime Minister Ioannis Metaxas suspended the constitutional order and imposed a dictatorship. All civil rights were waived and thousands of Greeks opposing to the regime were exiled to remote islands.

In 1967 another military coup suspended all civil rights for a further seven years. Following its collapse, a period of real democracy came into being, bearing a handful of gifts such as the abolition of monarchy, the closure of the political prisoners' camps, the destruction of the files of all anti-regime citizens, the recognition of the left-wing political parties, as well as the recognition of all the partisan groups that fought against the enemy during WWII, irrespective of their political affiliation.

The restoration of democracy in Greece took place in 1974. However, the first stamps that celebrated this huge historic event were issued only on its third anniversary in 1977. They were right. After all, looking back, one could never be sure!

In 2014, the Coreios de Portugal, CTT, honoured 40 years of democracy in Portugal, Spain and Greece, with a miniature sheet, depicting scenes of people flooding the streets demanding the fall of the dictatorships in the three countries. The m/s commemorated the Carnation Revolution in Portugal, the end of General Franco's regime in Spain and the end of the Greek junta. In a matter of just a few months, one after the other, the people of three countries of the European South were tasting freedom at last.

The 200th Anniversary of the Greek Revolution

The Philhellenes on Greek Stamps

The initiation of the 1821 Greek War of Independence, only three decades after the 1789 French Revolution and its worldwide impact, evoked the admiration not just of the intellectuals but of every single person with liberal ideas.

From the very beginning of the Greek War of Independence, a number of societies supporting the Greek cause were formed in almost every major European city. At the same time, financial aid was raised, newspaper articles and poems were written, and many experienced volunteers, as well as sympathising foreign citizens, arrived in Greece to fight alongside the Greek people. These foreigners, known as philhellenes (friends of Greece), were honoured by the Greek State on various occasions.

On the occasion of the 200th anniversary since the beginning of the Greek War of Independence, the Hellenic Philatelic Federation suggested to the Hellenic Post (ELTA) to produce a set of stamps honouring the philhellenes. The new stamps were placed in circulation on 23 September 2021.

His poems “Arise, oh Greece, Arise” and “Faithful Greek Woman” made the Greek War of Independence known to the Russian public evoking widespread empathy for the cause.

A writer with broad literary scope, it was for his political verse that he was persecuted. His “Ode to Liberty” resulted in his spending several years in exile initially, and under house arrest later. He still remained an unyielding champion of individual rights, social freedom, constitutional - democratic values and of national independence of occupied nations.

Eugene Delacroix (1798–1863), France

The great French romantic painter was influential to the formation of Impressionism. His art inspiration was largely related to historical events emerging from the French Revolution, the Greek Independence War and his journey to Morocco.

His paintings related to the adversities of the Greek War of Independence made a great impact on the French public and consolidated the philhellenic movement. His painting of “Greece on the ruins of Missolonghi”, following the town’s siege, was a turning point for the European wave of empathy for Greece.

Percy Bysshe Shelley (1792–1822), Great Britain

Shelley was a major English romantic poet. An aristocrat, Shelley had embraced radical ideas both in his poetry and his lifestyle, while he stood against traditional values. His poetry’s main themes were rebellion against authority, the power of the visionary imagination, the pursuit of harmonious co-existence with nature and of the ideal love, as well as the unbroken spirit constantly in search of freedom. He passed away at the age of 30 in the Gulf of La Spezia in Sardinia.

His poem “Hellas” was an ode of praise to the cause of the 1821 Greek War of Independence that had a great impact on the British public.

Samuel Gridley Howe (1801–1876), U.S.A.

Howe, an American physician and abolitionist, was a strong supporter of Greek Independence. He travelled to Greece in 1824 and immediately enlisted as a surgeon with the Greek forces. In 1827 he established on Poros island the American hospital for wounded soldiers and the poor population.

On his return to the U.S.A. in 1827, he raised funds for a Greece that had suffered a humanitarian crisis. In 1828 he published his memories of the Greek War of Independence entitled, “A Historical Sketch of the Greek Revolution”.

Howe was also a pioneer and advocate of education for the blind as well as for persons with mental disorders.

Karl Krazeisen (1794–1878), Bavaria

Krazeisen was born in 1794 in Upper Palatinate, Bavaria. As an officer of the Bavarian army, in 1813 he took part in the Napoleonic Wars (War of the Sixth Coalition). In 1826, along with other Bavarian volunteers, he came to Greece to fight alongside the Greek army as an officer. He stayed in Greece for only one year, but during his stay he took part in the important battle of Athens in 1826, the siege Acropolis and the Phaleron battle in 1827.

Krazeisen, a self-taught painter, made detailed drawings and portraits from the life of the most important protagonists and leaders of the war of independence, and following his return to Munich published his Greek Collection, which was republished seven times. Krazeisen’s work is invaluable for his detailed pictorial archive of the protagonists of the Greek War of Independence.

Lord Byron (1788–1824), Great Britain

George Gordon Byron, 6th Baron Byron, was one of the most important Romantic poets as well as a strong supporter of revolutionary movements in Italy and Greece. He passed away at the age of 36 due to a violent fever, fighting alongside the Greek revolutionaries in Missolonghi.

George Gordon, Lord of Byron, was a person beyond the accepted norms. A determined champion of liberty both in poetry and his life, Byron offered money, time and energy as well as his own life for the Greek War of Independence.



16.4.1924

Charles Nicolas Fabvier (1783–1855), France

A French General and Commander of the Greek regular army during the 1821 Greek War of Independence.

Fabvier is considered as the most efficient and celebrated of all the Philhellene officers that fought along the Greek forces during the period 1823 to 1828.

Fabvier adopted the traditional Greek clothing of the time and the living customs of his Greek co-fighters as nobody could tell that he was a foreigner.



1.8.1927

Johann Jakob Meyer, (1798–1826), Switzerland

Meyer, a Swiss philhellene, was the publisher the newspaper “Greek Chronicles”, the first printed newspaper during the Greek Revolution from 1st January 1824 until 20th February 1826 in Missolonghi town.

During the attempted sortie to relieve the siege of Missolonghi (10 April 1826), Meyer, his greek wife and both his children were killed.

Jean-Gabriel Eynard (1775–1863), Switzerland

Eynard was a Swiss banker, a pioneer photographer and a philhellene honoured with the title of the “Benefactor of the Greek Nation”. Motivated by Capodistria, Eynard joined the philhellenic movement. During the 1821 Greek Revolution he contributed large sums to the Greek cause and he repeatedly intervened in European Diplomacy in favour of the Greek positions.

He was personally involved in the organisation of the Greek National Economy and the establishment of the National Stock Exchange Bank, serving as its Honorary Chairman.

Our legacy

Neoklis Zafeirakopoulos



Neoklis Zafeirakopoulos was born in 1945 in Piraeus and grew up in Cavala, Northern Greece. In 1964 he went to West Germany as a University undergraduate in the fields of Aeronautics and Information Technology. During the Greek Dictatorship (1967-1974) he was an active member of the Resistance Movement in West Germany that “resulted” in the removal of his passport by the Greek authoritarian regime.

A member of the Hellenic Philatelic Society, Neoklis was an emblematic figure not only for his wide and in-depth knowledge, but mostly for his ability and dedication to question established views and certainties as well as to “unearth” philatelic treasures often overlooked by the experts.

He was a pioneer of Postal History in Greece, at a time when Traditional Philately was the unquestionable centre of the philatelic universe. Through his thorough observance and ability to produce new philatelic knowledge, he became the driving force that altered the established route. Being a person of reason and logic, he supported his often radical views, while at the same time he was willing to accept an exactly opposite consideration if one could convince him. His motto was: “I shall support my opinion with fervour, and in case I change my mind, I shall continue to support my new point of view likewise”.

He was a fierce opponent of forgeries and a strong supporter of philatelic exhibitions; an accredited FIP Postal History and Postal Stationery Juror and a dedicated collector and exhibitor of stamps, postal stationery and postal history of Greece, Albania, Bulgaria and Serbia.

He consciously opted to be the Librarian of the HPS. His hand-written notes between the pages of the books are mini-sized charts left for the reader to navigate through unlimited and unpublished precious philatelic knowledge.

He left us last September. For those of us privileged to have known him, we certainly miss him. However, his questioning thinking as well as his personal integrity and philatelic ethos will always be with us.

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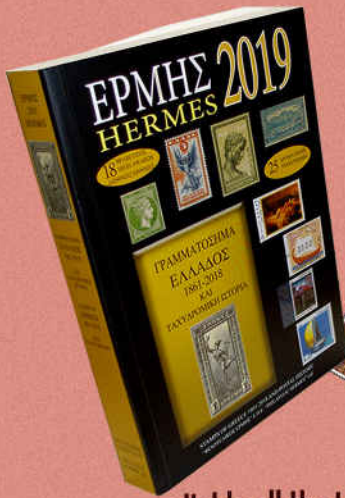


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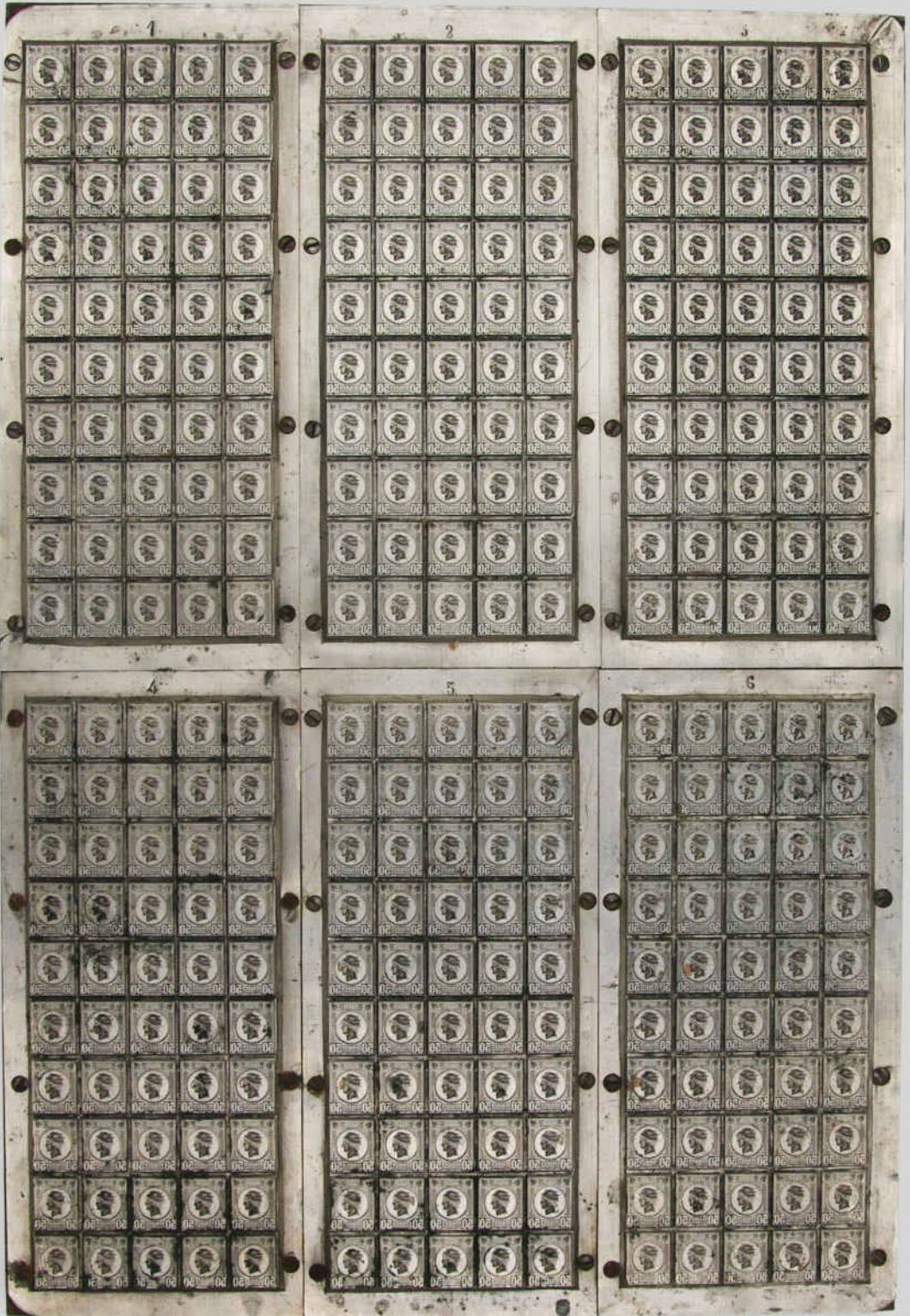
